Clifton Park, NY-Stuart Zamlong passed away unexpectedly on Sunday, January 15, 2023 in Clifton Park, New York. Born in the Bronx, New York, he was the son of the late Yetta and Morris Zamlong.

Stuart earned a Ph.D. in mathematics from Brown University in 1977 which included the development of a new math theorem. He later went on to get fully certified as an Actuary. Stuart held teaching positions at multiple universities covering a full range of math subjects and also worked for New York State in the Financial Services division. He was the beloved husband of the late Irene Ropelewski, whom he married on October 8, 2006 and brother of Joel Zamlong.

Stuart enjoyed watching all sports, especially New York Yankees baseball and volunteered at local theaters with his late wife Irene Ropelewski. He loved checkers and chess and the challenge of beating almost every opponent at checkers. Stuart will be remembered for his kind-hearted nature, caring conversation and amazing mathematic abilities.

Stuart will be missed by his family and friends including his brother Joel Zamlong; his niece and nephews along with their spouses and his great nieces and nephews.
